MARRIAGE

MR. E. A. P. L. TOWNSHEND AND MISS F. D. PRIOR-WANDESFORDE

The marriage took place yesterday at All Souls', Langham Place, of Mr. Edward Arthur Penderel Loftus Townshend, of Shamva, S. Rhodesia, fourth son of the late Mr. Charles L. Townshend, of Castletownshend, Co. Cork, and Mrs. Townshend, of Hill House, Reigate, Surrey, and Miss Florence Doreen Prior-Wandesforde, younger daughter of Captain and Mrs. R. H. Prior-Wandesforde, of Castlecomer House, Co. Kilkenny, and of Kirklington Hall, Yorkshire. The Bishop of Ossory officiated, assisted by the Rev. O. Brenton and the Rev. P. Waddington (cousin of the bridegroom).

The bride, who was given away by her father, wore a simply cut dress of deep ivory lunasol satin, with a close-fitting corsage and long transparent sleeves of mousseline de soie. Her court train, hanging from the shoulders, was formed by a shawl of Limerick lace, and her net veil was held in place by a halo of silver and pearl embroidery and orange-blossom. She carried a sheaf of longifolium lilies. The train was carried by Miss Anne Jameson (niece of the bride), who had a long parchment satin frock, with puff sleeves and a sash trimmed with geranium-coloured velvet, and a twisted bandeau in the same colours. There were two other attendants, Miss Parker-Hutchinson and Miss Gahan (cousin of the bride), who wore dresses of parchment satin, made on modern lines, with sashes trimmed with geranium-coloured crushed velvet, and velvet capes to match. They wore twisted bandeaux to match their dresses, and carried bouquets of red carnations. Mr. H. L. Townshend was best man to his brother.
